Student Power Roberta Lexier,2026-01-22 As global campus protests attract academic and public attention interest in student movements continues to grow however very little is known about the Canadian context Lexier s monograph offers the first detailed history of on campus activism in Canada Each chapter draws upon archival documents media reports and oral interviews to chronicle major upheavals in respectively the Sixties 1974 2000 and 2000 2020 Grounded in the larger historical political economic social cultural and institutional context of the period each analyzes the various demands and tactics the internal and external responses and perceivable outcomes Together they demonstrate that student movements regularly anticipate broader social and political developments and despite ongoing resistance to their confrontational strategies effectively advance democracy and social justice both on and off campus The conclusion brings the story to the present moment using news coverage survey data and interviews to examine recent pro Palestinian encampments at Canadian universities It encourages scholars activists and the general public to take student movements seriously positing that they are viewed as dangerous not because they interfere with university operations or public safety but because they often herald real transformative change

Prefiguring the Idea of the University for a Post-Capitalist Society Gary Saunders,2023-12-06 Using an Open Marxist theoretical framework this book provides a critique of the neoliberal reforms made to higher education since the late 1970s and the impact this has had on the sector Rather than arguing for a return to the idea of the public university the book argues that public and private models of higher education are both forms of capitalist accumulation and have historically perpetuated forms of oppression exploitation and discrimination thus a more radical solution that addresses both the current crisis of higher education and the contradictory and exploitative nature of late capitalism is required This book critically examines the autonomous learning spaces that emerged out of the UK student protests 2009 2010 and documents what can be learned from them to prefigure the idea of the university for a post capitalist society

Student Revolt, City, and Society in Europe Pieter Dhondt,Elizabethanne Boran,2017-07-06 Due to the strong sense among the student community of belonging to a specific social group student revolts have been an integral part of the university throughout its history Ironically since the Middle Ages the advantageous position of students in society as part of the social elite undoubtedly enforced their critical approach This edited collection studies the role of students as a critical mass within their urban context and society through examples of student revolts from

the foundation period of universities in the Middle Ages until today covering the whole European continent A dominant theme is the large degree of continuity visible in student revolts across space and time especially concerning the rebellious attitudes of and criticisms directed towards students Too often each generation thinks they are the first Moreover student revolts are definitely not always of a progressive kind but instead they are often characterized by a tension between conservative ambitions e g the protection of their own privileges or nostalgia for the good old days and progressive ideas Particular attention is paid to the use of symbols like flags caps etc rituals and special traditions within these revolts in order to bring the students voice back to the fore

Student Politics in Communist Poland Tom Junes,2015-01-22 Student Politics in Communist Poland tackles the topic of student political activity under a communist regime during the Cold War It discusses both the communist student organizations as well as oppositional independent and apolitical student activism during the forty five year period of Poland s existence as a Soviet satellite state The book focuses on consecutive generations of students who felt compelled to act on behalf of their milieu or for what they saw as the greater national good The dynamics between moderates and radicals between conformists and non conformists are analyzed from the points of view of the protagonists themselves The book traces ideological evolutions but also counter cultural trends and transnational influences in Poland s student community as they emerged developed and disappeared over more than four decades It elaborates on the importance of the Catholic Church and its role in politicizing students The regime s higher education policies are discussed in relation to its attempts to control the student body which in effect constituted an ever growing group of young people who were destined to become the regime s future elite in the political economic social and cultural spheres and thus provide it with the necessary legitimacy for its survival The pivotal crises in the history of Communist Poland those of 1956 1968 1980 1981 are treated with a special emphasis on the students and their respective role in these upheavals The book shows that student activism played its part in the political trajectory of the country at times challenging the legitimacy of the regime and contributed in no small degree to the demise of communism in Poland in 1989 Student Politics in Communist Poland not only presents a chronological narrative of student activism but it sheds light on lesser known aspects of modern Polish history while telling part of the life stories of prominent figures in Poland s communist establishment as well as its dissident and opposition milieux Ultimately it also provides insights into modern day Poland and its elite many of whose members laid the groundwork for their later careers as student activists during the communist period

Rhetoric and Resistance in the Corporate Academy Christopher Carter,2008 Rhetoric and Resistance in the Corporate Academy analyzes the political and legal struggles between labor movements and school administrators over the rise of part time and temporary jobs in higher education Focusing particular attention on the labor of writing instruction Carter finds among literacy workers both a deeply exploited segment of the campus population and a vector of resistance to the hegemony of flexible hiring Contrary to visions of ivory tower seclusion he traces continuities between teachers and

students experiences as corporate employees contending that their frequently insecure positions inadequate working conditions minimal benefits and marginalized voices constitute grounds for political alliance Carter then outlines a labor theory of agency that entails long range collaboration among tenure line faculty part time and non tenure track teachers and student social movements listening always for harmonies as well as dissonances among their modes of argument A History of African Higher Education from Antiquity to the Present Y.
