The conditions under which African writing developed in the past are only remotely similar to those of Western models, resulting in an inability of Eurocentric literary models to explore the hermeneutic world of African language poetics inherited from the oral and the modern worlds. Existing modes of criticism in the study of this literary tradition are often unsuited for a nuanced understanding of the intrinsic and extrinsic aspects at play in the composition, production and reading of these literatures. In *African Language Literatures*, Innocentia Jabulisile Mhlambi charts new directions in the study of African language literatures generally and isiZulu fiction in particular, by proposing that African popular arts and culture models be considered as a logical solution to current debates and challenges.
