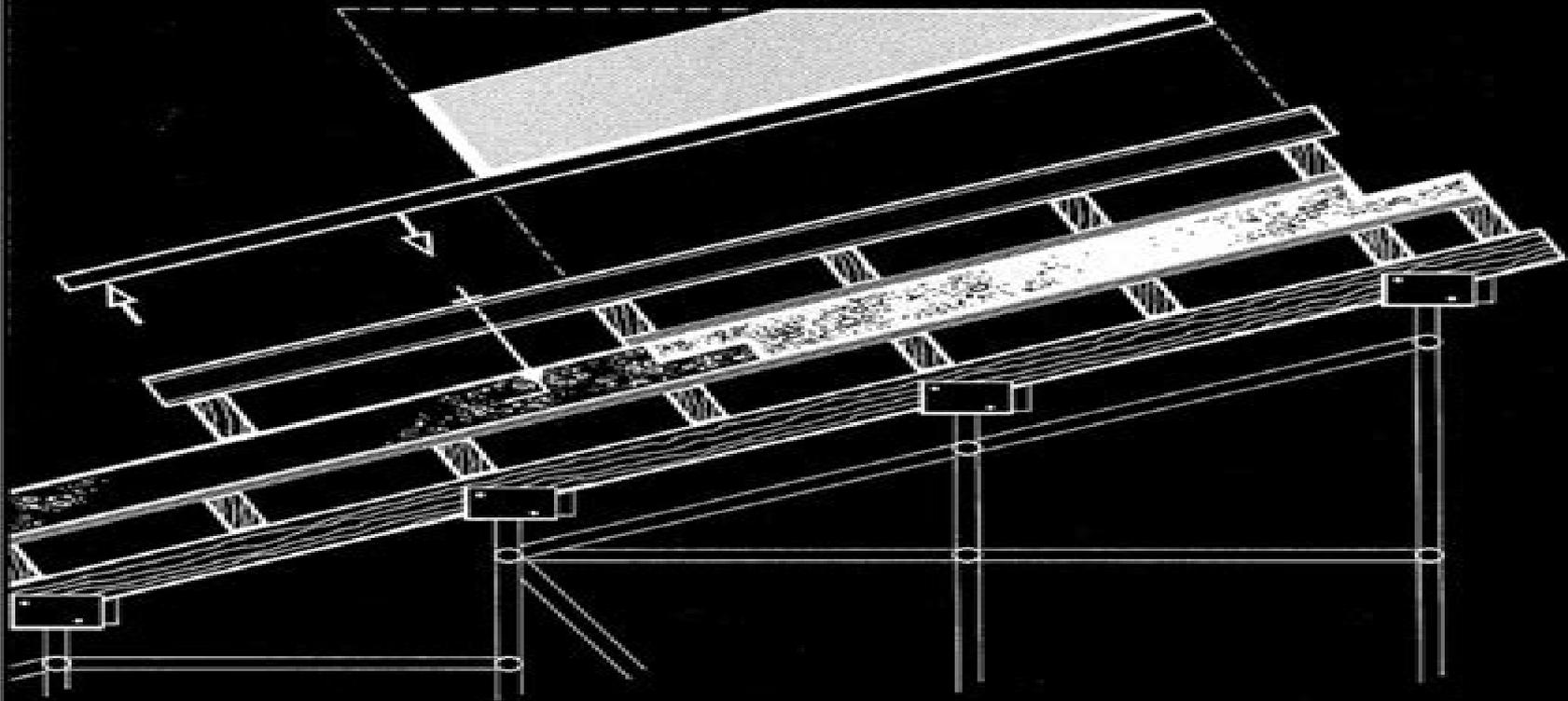



Cather,1995 This title provides advice on provision specification and construction of joints in in situ concrete construction It aims to help structural designers make informed decisions about the provision of joints in concrete structures **Formwork and Falsework for Heavy Construction** fib Fédération internationale du béton,2009-01-01 The realization process of civil engineering structures is complicated involving a wide variety of disciplines each of which brings a specific contribution It is a challenge to structure the process so that a balanced optimized participation of the many disciplines involved is achieved One of the critical success factors is knowledge management each discipline should bring professional knowledge but they should interact at interfaces as well Temporary structures are an example of this phenomenon they are right in the middle of a complex system of interactions between structural engineering site engineering work preparation procurement and execution They have a significant impact on cost construction time construction methodology and the through life performance of the actual structure Formwork and falsework are among the most important elements of temporary structures for civil engineering projects Knowledge management with respect to formwork and falsework requires engineers to share knowledge and experience in the broadest sense as the actual performance of formwork and falsework can only be evaluated at a late stage in the realization process when some disciplines are no longer present The learning circle can therefore only be closed through feedback fib Bulletin 48 presents an overview of formwork and falsework techniques and addresses issues related to the design and application thereof Its objective is to bridge the gap often experienced in practice by effectively feeding back state of the art knowledge and experience with regard to formwork and falsework thus making a larger group of engineers familiar with the important issues related to the design and application of formwork and falsework It aims to provide both structural and site engineers

with information to design and use formwork and falsework in a safe reliable and economic way thus achieving better interaction between the engineering disciplines involved Bulletin 48 addresses some fundamental issues related to formwork and falsework The appearance of the finished concrete which is closely related to the quality of the formwork The performance of the finished concrete in relation to durability and as part of Life Cycle Management The need to support the concrete while it acquires enough strength and stiffness to support itself In this context the most important issue is structural safety The guidelines given in this document are based on the experience of site and design engineers and most of the advice is a consequence of real problems experienced in the past Any warnings based solely on theoretical judgment have been avoided only recommendations based on experience have been included fib Bulletin 48 focuses on principles only and therefore does not address detailed design issues for which local design codes should be applied Concrete, 1999

Existing concrete structures life management, testing and structural health monitoring FIB International Federation for Structural Concrete, 2023-10-01 The through life management of our constantly ageing infrastructure is a basic requirement in order to ensure their structural safety and serviceability Each structure experiences deterioration processes with time leading to a decrease of structural safety and serviceability The design of new structures considers the expected deterioration for a defined period the design service life However a frequent survey of structural safety controlling structural condition should be mandatory and a maintenance plan should be an integral part of the design In addition many structures have exceeded their design service life already or are very close to it leading to an increasing demand for condition assessment On the one hand assumptions made during design are not valid any more due to change of the loads e.g. increasing traffic loads in terms of number and weights On the other hand design codes evolved over time in such a way that existing structures do not comply with today's standards In all these cases the through life management is an important tool to maintain the accessibility of existing structures with known reliability In line with the new Model Code for Concrete Structures which includes guidance for both design of new structures and assessment of existing structures the Task Group 3.3 focused on the compilation of a state of the art guideline for the through life management of existing concrete structures including Data acquisition by testing and monitoring techniques Condition assessment for the evaluation of existing structures Performance prediction using advanced methods Decision making procedures to perform a complete assessment of existing structure The overall objective of the through life management is the assessment of the current condition and the estimation of the remaining service life under consideration of all boundary conditions **The bases of the structural behaviour of steel-concrete construction** FIB - International Federation for Structural Concrete, 2026-01-01 The bases of the structural behaviour of steel concrete construction is a Bulletin developed by fib Commission 2 Analysis and Design and more specifically by Task Group 2.6 Composite Steel Concrete Construction The document is fully consistent with the mission of Commission 2 which recognises analysis and design as the core tasks of structural engineering and promotes the

development of physically based coherent and design oriented models for structural assessment and dimensioning In recent years and with due respect given to the responsible use of resources the role of structural analysis has grown significantly In other words this growth was driven by the need for refined models capable of realistically describing stress strain states under serviceability and ultimate limit conditions as well as under long term effects fatigue fire and extreme actions At the same time and with a desire to minimize our environmental footprint the refined design of new structures comprising conception dimensioning and detailing remains fundamental to engineering practice fib Commission 2 supports a unified approach to all of the aforementioned activities whereby the same mechanical principles underpin both advanced analytical models and simplified methods suitable for practical application Steel concrete composite construction involving materials with markedly different mechanical and time dependent behaviours provides a particularly meaningful field in which to pursue this objective Although steel concrete composite solutions are well known and widely used worldwide their development has followed different traditions depending on whether the design culture has been primarily rooted in reinforced concrete or in steel structures Consequently similar mechanical phenomena may be treated differently in design practice and in code provisions despite sharing common physical foundations This Bulletin is aimed at bridging this gap by revisiting the fundamental aspects of steel concrete composite construction from an integrated perspective consistent with the fib principles of homogenisation and integrity of structural concepts across materials The Bulletin proposes rational and mechanics based models aimed at supporting engineers understanding of structural behaviour and improving the quality of design decisions It addresses the sectional behaviour of composite members under complete and partial interaction the modelling of shear connections instability and buckling of composite columns time dependent effects of concrete and the analysis of statically determinate and indeterminate composite systems Fatigue phenomena and structural behaviour under fire conditions are also examined Particular attention is given throughout to material nonlinearity construction stages load history imperfections and second order effects in line with the analytical and design philosophy promoted by fib Commission 2 The activity of fib Commission 2 is explicitly oriented towards supporting the development and continuous improvement of the fib Model Code and this Bulletin contributes to that objective by consolidating research outcomes and established knowledge into a coherent and mechanically consistent framework By presenting concepts and models that are applicable to both new and existing structures and that are compatible with uniform safety formats the Bulletin provides a technical basis that can inform future fib Model Code provisions and their interpretation in practice

Modelling structural performance of existing concrete structures FIB - International Federation for Structural Concrete, 2024-06-01 Many existing structures have to be assessed to find out whether they still satisfy the demands of structural safety There are various possibilities to be regarded structures can be still in good condition but exposed to traffic loads which are larger than assumed in the original design Moreover structures can sufferer material deterioration reducing the bearing capacity Finally

structures may originally have been designed according to rules which are not anymore in agreement with the actual demands So non compliant details may lead as well to insufficient structural safety In order to be able to determine the actual structural safety the structural performance of existing structures should be described as realistically as possible The bulletin is a state of the art report treating many subjects related to structural safety of existing structures This includes determination of the residual capacity of structures subjected to higher loads than initially assumed Moreover it deals with the change of the properties of structural materials suffering deterioration and the determination of the residual bearing capacity of structures with those deteriorated materials Also examples are given with regard to the determination of the structural safety of structures with various types of non compliant details Finally attention is given to assessment of existing structures by numerical simulation and by proof loading
