

Definition of Historical Linguistics

- “Historical linguistics deals with language change. Historical linguistics is sometimes called *diachronic* linguistics (from Greek *dia-* 'through' + *chronos* 'time' +*-ic*), since historical linguists are concerned with change in language or languages over time.”
(Campbell, 1998)
- It is the study of how language has evolved in time to acquire the current situation.
- The primary tool of historical linguistics is the comparative method, a way of identifying relations among languages in the absence of written records. For this reason, historical linguistics is sometimes called comparative-historical linguistics.
